Dear Professor Trimmer:

Please do not consider me ungrateful because such a long time elapsed before I am writing you to thank you most heartily for your great kindness during my stay at Knoxville on Nov. 15th and 16th. My lecture trip through the States was prolonged until December, and when after a sea voyage and a travel through France and Switzerland I arrived at home I found my desk buried under a kind of avalanche of letters and printed matter.
